

TOGETHER WE RISE: United We Bargain/Divided We Beg

Everyone knows someone who works a low-wage, non-union job. Poor health insurance, no job security, and no way to afford a vacation. These jobs save money for corporations, but they cost workers a lot.

Workers have power to fight for good jobs by coming together in a union. That's why states like Washington, where unions are strong, have higher wages than states where unions are weak.

But not everyone is a fan of worker power. Corporate bullies work to give unions a bad name, and the politicians who serve them aim to make workers weak across the nation. If they succeed, policies could come into effect that would make it harder for workers to exercise their power as a group, and harder to bargain for those higher wages and benefits. That's why it's more important than ever that we keep our union strong. With a strong union, we can:

- Keep fighting for the best wages and benefits
- Keep calling for safe working conditions, fairness, and dignity
- Keep standing together against attacks on our communities

To fortify our union, members have been talking to members in the workplace and at their homes. Since July, we've had 1661 members sign commitment cards—pledging to protect our house by standing with our union. We also have 224 new commitments to contribute to the Worker Power Fund—our shared fund for political action.

Many of you gave us your input on what you need your job to provide for your family, and right now, we're compiling those results.

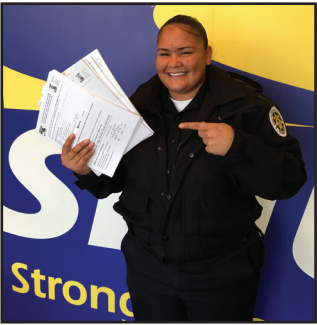
We're aiming to have our bargaining goals defined by November. It's time to gear up for the fight!

RESISTING
DIVIDE-AND-CONQUER

A Message from Our President, Sergio Salinas

Divide and conquer politics are used too often these days—with the goal of keeping American workers separate, and fighting each other over employers' table scraps. When politicians target groups like immigrants, they make one group vulnerable in order to keep wages down for all.

But workers know that when we come together, we raise the standard of living for everyone. That's why we act when we see our sisters and brothers in trouble, such as those rebuilding from hurricanes in Puerto Rico, Texas, and Florida. And it's why we act when we see attacks on our immigrant brothers and sisters, such as those threatened by the end of DACA, TPS, and assaults on sanctuary cities.

The City of Burien became a sanctuary city earlier this year, choosing to prohibit city employees from asking residents about their immigration status. It was a move to ease the threat of separation that some immigrant families face. When a group tried to end Burien's sanctuary city status, our union, together with a coalition, successfully fought back the attack.

When we stand together, workers and communities united, we are able to secure real, positive changes that affect the lives of real workers here in Washington. A great example of our united power is Initiative 1433, the statewide ballot initiative that increased the state minimum wage and ensures paid sick and safe leave for workers.

The new law, which begins January 1, 2018, will allow more than 1 million workers access to 40 hours of paid leave each year to take care of themselves or family members when they are sick or facing crisis. I am very proud of our union, SEIU6, for leading on these efforts and raising the standards for workers—first in SeaTac, then Seattle, and now the entire state.
